Summary

To determine the policy around the future of the legacy alcohol related Public Space Protection Order.

Recommendation (s)

The Committee is asked to:

- (1) Authorise the Head of Housing and Community to carry out a public consultation on behalf of the Council on the basis of the proposed Public Spaces Protection Order outlined in appendix 1 of this report and for results of this consultation to be considered at the next meeting of the Crime and Disorder Committee, or;
- (2) Identify which restrictions set out in Para 5 of the draft Order in appendix 1 ought to be taken forward and authorise the Head of Housing and Community to carry out a public consultation on behalf of the Council and for the results of this consultation to be considered at the next meeting of the Crime and Disorder Committee, or;
- (3) Agree not to renew the Public Spaces Protection Order and therefore allow the existing alcohol control provisions to lapse on 22 December 2024.

1 Reason for Recommendation

- 1.1 The committee is <u>not</u> being asked to make a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO), at its meeting of 22 October 2024. Whatever the decision of the committee, there will be a further opportunity to consider the proposals at its next meeting, together with the results of the required consultation which itself will represent a body of evidence for consideration.
- 1.2 A decision is required as to the future of the present PSPO and three viable options have been identified as recommendations.
- 1.3 The proposals have been developed using examples in place elsewhere in Surrey and more widely and have been designed, at police request, to enable additional support in the fight against antisocial behaviour and to offer enhanced community assurance.
- 1.4 At this stage and in order to protect all options, officers consider that recommendation one is the most advantageous as it enables the council to gauge public support on the fullest range of measures without committing to anything until the results of that consultation have been received and analysed. These results will in themselves contribute to the evidential base and it is expected that they will be available in time for the March 2025 meeting of the committee.

2 Background

- 2.1 Public Spaces Protection Orders are intended to deal with a particular nuisance or problem in a specific area that is detrimental to the local community's quality of life, by imposing conditions on the use of that area which apply to everyone. They are intended to help ensure that the law abiding majority can use and enjoy public spaces, safe from anti-social behaviour.
- 2.2 Local councils are responsible for making Public Spaces Protection Orders. Borough councils take the lead in England with county councils or unitary authorities undertaking the role where there is no district or borough.
- 2.3 It had been anticipated the previous government's proposed legislative changes would enable the police to propose their own PSPOs. The previous government were to bring in provisions to amend the law to allow them to take forward their own proposals. However, these provisions have not to date been re-convened by the current government and it is for the Borough Council to continue make policy in this area.

2.4 This particular PSPO has its heritage in the previous Designated Public Space Orders which were a feature of the now repealed section 13 of the Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001. The existing PSPO is limited to a defined geographical boundary. It has been renewed as a PSPO on 2 occasions since then, each time for three years with some minor boundary changes.

3 Proposed changes

- 3.1 At request of the police the proposals include expansion both the geographical area of the PSPO to cover the entire borough and to provide additional community support provisions to counteract antisocial behaviour in public spaces.
- 3.2 The proposed prohibitions in the PSPO include:
 - a. Harassing or intimidating residents, businesses or members of the public.
 - b. Threatening any person with violence and / or being verbally abusive towards any person.
 - c. Urinating in an open public place.
 - d. Littering or spitting with the intent to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person.
 - e. Wearing a piece of clothing with the intent to obscure or hide their identity for the purposes of committing crime and/or anti-social behaviour.
 - f. Acting, or inciting others to act, in an anti-social manner, that is to say a manner that is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person.
 - g. Joining or remaining in a group of 2 or more people which is acting in a manner that is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person.
 - h. Consumption of alcohol following a verbal warning by an authorised person to stop. An authorised person includes a Police Constable, Police Community Support Officer, a Council Officer, or any other person authorised by the Council.
- 3.3 Appendix 1 contains the proposed PSPO whilst appendix 2-5 contain the current evidential basis on which the PSPO is being sought. It is anticipated that depending on which option the committee adopts, further evidence will arise from the consultation exercise and will be available for consideration at the next meeting of the committee. Appendix 6 contains the proposed consultation material.

- 3.4 The proposal to expand the geographical boundary is because the evidence points towards the issues being widely spread and not confined to one area of the borough. Secondly, and to guard against displacement, it is assessed that a borough wide PSPO is the most suitable approach.
- 3.5 The threshold for determination that a PSPO is necessary is "reasonable grounds". That is to say the council must be certain that there are reasonable grounds to make the Order. Reasonable grounds may be considered to be the lowest evidential threshold and certainly well below the criminal standard of "beyond all reasonable doubt". Not withstanding this, as a piece of criminal law, authorised officers need to demonstrate the criminal standard has been met in any use of the PSPO.
- 3.6 The committee will further note that the proposed restrictions have been designed to be focussed, precise, and to address the effect of the detrimental behaviour rather than activities which may not in themselves be detrimental or which target characteristics that might be shared by many other people. For example, under the existing draft it would not be an offence to wear a piece of clothing with the intent to obscure or hide identity. Were this to be the case it would almost certainly offend equalities legislation. In order for the PSPO to be engaged, this circumstance must be accompanied by evidence of them committing a crime or anti-social behaviour and so address the detrimental effect of antisocial behaviour perpetrated by those wearing ski masks, balaclavas and other face coverings evidenced in appendix 2-5.
- 3.7 Similarly, it is not the intention to criminalise anyone who chooses to form in a group for any lawful purpose and there are a vast number of positive reasons why people will come together in a public space for work, leisure, exercise or entertainment. However, the evidence points to occasions in the borough where a groups of people come together to cause harassment, alarm and distress to other innocent members of the public, businesses and residents and it is the behaviour, not the activity which requires additional control.
- 3.8 The remainder of the provisions are assessed as necessary taking into account available evidence and likely public support.

4 Public consultation

- 4.1 Should the committee determine either option one or two in the recommendations, it is anticipated that the required consultation be carried during the months of November, December and January hosted on the council's consultation webpage and be promoted via:
 - Appearing on the council's website news carousel
 - A social media campaign on both council and police platforms
 - A conventional media release

- Depositing the document in all borough libraries and council community venues
- Posters in Borough Boards
- Article in E-Borough Insight
- Through engagement with youth services
- Through engagement with local colleges and universities

It is proposed the consultation be via the council's Microsoft Office forms capability accessed via a QR code or shortform web address. To support those who cannot or prefer not to use this, conventional paper forms will be either posted out to those who request them or be ready at the Town Hall reception. Additionally for those who simply prefer to email or write, it will be possible to respond in these conventional ways.

4.2 A copy of the proposed consultation material appears in appendix 6 which will be varied depending on which option the committee selects.

5 Risk Assessment

7 Legal Implications

- 7.1 Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 states the Council must, "exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent;
- 7.2 Section 59 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 permits a local authority to make a PSPO in the areas where a particular nuisance or problem occurs which is detrimental to the local community's quality of life.
- · Crime and disorder
- The misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances
- Re-offending and
- Serious violence"
- 7.3 **Legal Officer's comments:** A PSPO may be considered to be an appropriate response where the Council have identified specific issues within the Borough. A single PSPO can incorporate a range of conditions targeting different ASB issues. The Order once implemented can be in place for 3 years, and may be extended beyond this for a further three-year period(s) in circumstances where certain criteria are met.

Public Spaces Protection Order No.1 of 2024

Notice is hereby given that Epsom and Ewell Borough Council ("the Council") has made the following Public Spaces Protection Order under section 59 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 ("the Act"):

ORDER

In exercise of its powers under section 59 of the Anti-Social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014.

- 1. This Order may be cited as Epsom and Ewell Borough Council Public Spaces Protection Order No.1 of 2024 ("the Order"). This Order takes effect on the XXXX January 2024 and continues to have effect for a period of three years thereafter.
- 2. This Order applies to the land within the Epsom and Ewell Borough, being land in the area of the Council, to which the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 applies and will be protected by the making of this order (the Restricted Area).
- 3. This Order applies to all persons in 'public places' within the Restricted Area at all times of the day and night, save on where otherwise stated within the prohibitions. For the purposes of this Order, 'public places' means any place to which the public or any section of the public has access, on payment or otherwise, as of right or by virtue of express or implied permission.
- 4. The Council is also satisfied that the conditions set out in Section 59(3) of the Act have been met, namely, that the effect or likely effect of the activities is, or is likely to be, of a persistent or continuing nature and that these activities are unreasonable and justify the restrictions imposed by this Order.

PROHIBITIONS

- 5. The effect of the Order is to impose the following conditions on the use of the Restricted Area:
- In the Restricted Area a person commits an offence if without reasonable excuse they continue to carry out activities which are prohibited namely;
- 5.1.1 Harassing or intimidating residents, businesses or members of the public.
- 5.1.2 Threatening any person with violence and / or being verbally abusive towards any person.
- 5.1.3 Urinating in an open public place.
- 5.1.4 Littering or spitting with the intent to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person.
- 5.1.5 Wearing a piece of clothing with the intent to obscure or hide their identity for the purposes of committing crime and/or anti-social behaviour.

- 5.1.6 Acting, or inciting others to act, in an anti-social manner, that is to say a manner that is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person.
- 5.1.7 Joining or remaining in a group of 2 or more people which is acting in a manner that is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person.
- 5.1.8 Consumption of alcohol following a verbal warning by an authorised person to stop. An authorised person includes a Police Constable, Police Community Support Officer, a Council Officer, or any other person authorised by the Council.
- 6. For the purposes of paragraph 5.1.8 of this Order:

Paragraph 5.1.8 of this Order does not apply to alcohol being consumed within premises licensed under the Licensing Act 2003 or s115E of the Highways Act 1980 have a premises license of club premises certificate for the sale or supply of alcohol. This provision also does not apply to events within the Restricted Area which are licensed for the sale or supply of alcohol.

OFFENCE AND FIXED PENALTY NOTICES


- 7. In accordance with section 63 of the Act, a person found to be in breach of paragraph 5.1.8 of this Order is guilty of an offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 2 on the standard scale.
- 8. In accordance with section 67 of the Act, a person found to be in breach of any other provision of this Order is guilty of an offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale
- 9. An authorised person may issue a Fixed Penalty Notice of £100 under Section 68 of the Act to anyone they have reason to believe has committed an offence under this Order.

APPEALS

10. In accordance with section 66 of the Act, any interested person who wishes to challenge the validity of this Order on the grounds that the Council did not have the power to make the Order or that any requirement of the Act has not been complied with may apply to the High Court within six weeks from the date on which this Order is made. "Interested person" means an individual who lives in the restricted area or who regularly works in or visits that area.




During the period March 2023 to July 2024 there were 670 incidents reported to Surrey Police in the Borough of Epsom and Ewell where face coverings such as balaclavas or face masks were involved. Incidents involving the use of face coverings has steadily risen month on month since June 2023 where just 10 were reported, to a peak of 80 during June 2024.


There is no correlation between the use of face coverings in the autumn /winter season with the most significant increase in the use seen outside of the colder months.


Recent incidents involving the use if face coverings include robberies, burglaries, theft of bikes and the antisocial use of motorbikes.

Antisocial behaviour data for the period 01/02/2024 – 31/07/2024.

During the 6-month period ending 31st July 2024 Surrey Police received 746 reports classified as ASB with the largest proportion being in relation to the antisocial size of vehicles and rowdy behaviour. The map shows that the incidents recorded under the two main types are spread across the borough.

Epsom and Ewell – Public Space Protection Order (PSPO)

What is a PSPO?

Public Space Protection Orders are enacted under powers given by the Antisocial Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014 and are designed to prevent antisocial behaviour in our communities such as issues on streets, parks, town centres and other community spaces. The order specifies an area where certain activities are prohibited to improve the local community's quality of life. The intention is to ensure that the law-abiding majority can use and enjoy public spaces safe from anti-social behaviour.

The PSPO is enforced by Police Officers, Police Community Support Officers and Council Enforcement Officers who can instruct a person to stop the prohibited behaviour in the designated area and / or require them to leave. Failure to comply with the instruction could result in a fine or prosecution.

PSPOs in Epsom and Ewell

The current PSPO expiring on **22nd December 2024** focuses on the consumption of alcohol in a public place. These are legacy arrangements originally brought in via a previous legal provision in the mid-2000s and renewed since. Whilst these controls remain valuable with the issue requiring monitoring and intervention, two key area of concern have emerged and been identified as having a significant impact on the community. The wearing of balaclavas and face-coverings to conceal identity and groups behaving in an antisocial manner are areas of significant community concern. It is therefore suggested that the geography and prohibitions on the current PSPO are amended to assist in addressing the concerns identified.

It is suggested that the following prohibitions are included to address these identified concerns which are detailed further below:


- Wearing a piece of clothing with the intent to obscure or hide their identity for the purposes of committing crime and/or anti-social behaviour.
- Joining or remaining in a group of 2 or more people which is acting in a manner that is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person.

Community Concerns

The concerns have been identified through data and community engagement – both in person and via Police reporting channels. This is further supported by reports to Epsom & Ewell Borough Council.

Face coverings & balaclavas

Reports to Police involving the use of face coverings have increased significantly in the last 12 months. Groups of people wearing balaclavas have become common place across the borough and the use has been linked to concealing identities to commit street robberies, assaults, thefts, burglaries and ASB such as riding motorbikes dangerously in the town centre and across open spaces. Since March 2023 there have been 670 reports to Surrey Police where balaclavas and face coverings have been involved in Epsom & Ewell. This has increased from 10 per month in June 2023 to 80 per month in June 2024.



It is considered that additional controls on the wearing of clothing with the intent to obscure or hide identity **for the purposes of committing crime and/or anti-social behaviour,** are a reasonable and proportionate response to this local issue and will provide enhanced community assurance on this increasing trend.

Groups behaving in an antisocial manner causing harassment, alarm and ditsress.

Reports of groups congregating in the town centre, the alley ways connecting the borough and the open spaces behaving in a way so as to cause harassment, alarm and distress are received by Police daily. Residents report that their families are unable to enjoy the many open spaces due to groups riding motorcycles and e-bikes across open spaces, often at speed with near misses with young children playing reported. Residents who also report suspected drug supply, report that when challenging the groups they have become victims of verbal abuse and threats to cause harm.

Within the town centre, members of the public, retailers, security staff and the Business Improvement District report groups gathering and entering stores acting in an anti-social manner.



Recent reports include large groups entering stores to steal eggs which have then been thrown at members of the public and large groups gathering in Epsom Square on motor bikes and wearing balaclavas.

To combat this, it is considered that additional controls on the joining or remaining in a group of 2 or more people who are acting in a manner that is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to any person is an appropriate and proportionate response, allowing police to engage with such people and requiring dispersal if necessary.

Antisocial behaviour data for the period 01/02/2024 - 31/07/2024.

During the 6-month period ending 31st July 2024 Surrey Police received 746 reports classified as ASB with the largest proportion being in relation to the antisocial use of vehicles and rowdy behaviour. The map shows that the incidents recorded under the two main types are spread across the borough.



Using the PSPO

Police officers use discretion daily, in a variety of situations using various powers and existing longstanding pieces of legislation. The additional powers provided under the suggested enhanced PSPO are no different and are to be used in a way that is proportionate, legal and necessary. Police are trained in the appropriate use of enforcement tools and required to justify their use every time.

The order would provide officers with a low-level early intervention option where the presence and behaviours of individuals or groups is likely to cause harassment, alarm, and distress. It is often used to prevent escalation to arrest for criminal offences such as offences under the Public Order Act.

There is no suggestion of a 'blanket' prohibition of being in company with a group of people **unless** the actions and behaviours of that group are likely to cause harassment, alarm, or distress to other members of the public. If for example, a group of 20 students go for a peaceful picnic in a park for their lunch break then they would not be part of group likely to cause harassment, alarm, or distress. Conversely, a group of 4 intoxicated adult males in the town centre behaving in a loud and intimidating manner whilst waiting for a taxi home could be considered likely to cause harassment, alarm, and distress and under the PSPO could be instructed to either cease the behaviour or leave the area.

Whilst police have an option to impose a 48-hour dispersal order in a specified locality which might achieve a similar effect, this often results in increased community alarm and is viewed more as an emergency stopgap. The use instead, of the proposed order will form part of a wider problem-solving response which aims to restore pubic confidence to use open spaces and playparks and support our economy by ensuring retailers, residents and visitors to the town centre and other commercial areas feel safe.

Additionally, it seeks to safeguard young people in our community by allowing no individual to be able to conceal their identity to commit crime and criminally exploit children in areas such as drug supply and acquisitive crime.

Council ASB Data

Not all complaints of ASB reported to the Council are considered to be ASB and are recorded under separate references of neighbourhood disputes, noise nuisance, flytipping etc. The data presented in this appendix is broken down into the following categories:

- Group of persons behaving in an antisocial behaviour
- Drug related ASB issues
- ASB perpetrated by persons wearing face coverings
- Vehicular related ASB issues
- Occasions of verbal abuse
- Other ASB not falling into the above.

During the period August 2023 to August 2024 there were 74 ASB incidents brought to the attention of Epsom and Ewell Borough Council via a number of methods. These include reports from members of the public, reports from colleagues within the Council and issues brought to the attention of CHaRMM and JAG meetings.

The areas with the highest number of issues are Bourne Hall and the Community and Wellbeing Centre – this is likely due to staff raising complaints to the Community Safety Team more frequently than members of the public may. Members of the public may be more likely to report ASB issues to the Police as their first point of call rather than the Council and so this data set must be read in conjunction with police data. A heatmap has been created highlighting the areas of concern that have been reported to Council.

Antisocial Behaviour reports into the Council

Meetings have been held with the Council's Commercial Services Team who have reported an increasing numbers of issues caused by groups of people over the last 12-18 months at community buildings.

Bourne Hall

Issues with groups of people coming to the location at night, vandalising the equipment, bringing alcohol and drugs, and consuming these on site and other antisocial behaviour issues. Most recently, an incident took place on 7th August where a group of youths were interfering with a Council Transport from Home vehicle, tried to open the doors whilst the driver was inside and caused the driver to feel alarmed/distressed. They then proceeded to climb onto the tail lift of the moving vehicle.

- 1. Group of youths causing ASB on roof of building
- 2. Building equipment stolen off roof
- 3. Groups of people causing damage to banner rails and placing graffiti on patio furniture
- 4. Lightning conductors torn from the roof and thrown into park
- 5. Groups of people causing ASB (pond fishing)
- 6. Groups of people causing ASB (swimming in pond)
- 7. Drug ASB high number of nitrous oxide cannisters found around building and in the car park
- 8. Groups entering the building and causing ASB inside

Community and Wellbeing Centre

The Wellbeing and Community Centre also report that over the last 12 months they have had issues with groups of people wearing balaclavas, persisting around the car park, starting fires, taking drugs, and intimidating staff. This is beginning to threaten some of the services being offered at this location.

- 1. Groups of people smoking cannabis on site
- 2. Groups of people loitering and causing ASB also laughing and mocking Dementia Hub clients and at times swearing/being abusive to staff
- 3. Groups of people entering the building and causing ASB inside
- 4. Groups of people wearing balaclavas and riding mopeds at high speed through the car park and smoking cannabis
- 5. Groups using the area for drug dealing and drug use
- 6. ASB litter issues
- 7. Groups of people starting fires in car park
- 8. Groups of youths shouting expletives through the windows of the building
- 9. Groups of youths intentionally throwing items such as footballs into the building via open windows
- 10. Groups of people throwing items at EEBC meals at home vehicle
- 11. Groups of people attempting to get inside EEBC transport bus and climbing onto moving vehicles

The following incidents are reports made to the council concerning other locations in the past 12 months.

- 1. Groups of people wearing balaclavas driving at high speed in and around Ruxley Lane/Scotts Farm Road which has been reported to us on numerous occasions
- 2. Group of people causing antisocial behaviour in Hook Road Car Park
- 3. Groups of people causing antisocial behaviour in Hudson House Car Park (particularly throwing eggs, putting nails in tyres and drinking
- 4. Groups of people causing antisocial behaviour in the Ashley Centre Car Park (throwing eggs at cars/people)

Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) Public Consultation

A Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) is made by a Local Authority if satisfied on reasonable grounds that two conditions are met. Firstly, that:

- (i) activities carried on in a public place within the authority's area have had a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality; and
- (ii) it is likely that activities will be carried on in a public place within that area and that they will have such an effect.

The second condition is that the effect, or likely effect, of the activities is, or is likely to be of a persistent or continuing nature, such as to make the activities unreasonable, and therefore justifies the restrictions imposed by the notice.

A PSPO is an order that identifies the public place and prohibits specified things being done in the restricted area and/or requires specified things to be done by persons carrying on specified activities in that area. The order may not have effect for more than 3 years and the Local Authority must consult with the chief officer of the police and the local policing body before issuing the order. Failure to comply with a public spaces protection order is an offence.

What is a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO)?

PSPOs aim to discourage anti-social behaviour in public areas and give police officers and the council powers to intervene early, preventing anti-social behaviour escalating into a crime. Epsom and Ewell put a PSPO in place in Epsom town centre in 2018 because of local concerns about anti-social behaviour in the town centre. The order was renewed in 2021 following a public consultation which identified a strong support for its continuation. The PSPO is now up for review.

What area does the PSPO cover?

Epsom and Ewell's PSPO currently only covers certain areas within the Borough, however this review looks to amend the Order and cover the Borough in its entirety. This is all with the sole purpose of reducing anti-social behaviour issues in the Borough.

What behaviours does the PSPO cover?

The PSPO sets out a range of controlled behaviours and means that a person will commit an offence if they fail to comply with a request by an authorised officer to cease any of those behaviours within the specified area - it could result in either a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued, or prosecution.

The controlled behaviours listed in the order are intended to cover a range of anti-social behaviour, and include: threatening violence; being verbally abusive; urinating in an open public place; littering or spitting with the intent to cause harassment, alarm or distress.
